MIDAS NOTABLES & CHARACTERS Louis Reymond was 52 years old when he collapsed on the trail between Midas and the Elko Prince Mine on September 21, 1932. A mining engineer and native of Switzerland, Reymond moved to Midas from Tonopah in 1916. In Goldfield and Tonopah, he participated in the design and construction of a miniature mine which was displayed at the Mines and Metallurgy Building of the 1915 San Francisco Panama-Pacific Exposition. After moving to Midas, it was reported in area newspapers that he made \$17,000 in 1917 working the tailings of the Elko Prince Mine. In addition to being a pilot and one of the earliest owners of an automobile in Midas (1918), Reymond was President of the Gold Circle Buick Mining Company. Byron Wilkerson remembered that Reymond lived just north of DeLong's place and was popular with the town's children because he always had a funny story to tell. He often played his violin for the entertainment of the children. On May 27, 1920, the Nevada State Journal described him as "one of Gold Circle's most popular and successful miners" when it reported his wedding in Winnemucca. "The happy couple received the congratulations from their many friends, who wish them all kinds of good luck, and are now settled down in the cosy (sic) house up the canyon which Mr. Raymond (sic) has owned for some time." By 1930, however, Reymond appeared on the census detail for Midas without a spouse. Two years later. Frank Macy, in his capacity as coroner recorded Reymond's death as due to natural causes. According to Desda Warren Wood, an adolescent at that time who resided with her family in Midas, Reymond had tuberculosis and it had hemorrhaged. At the time of his death, his personal property reportedly consisted of an Edison phonograph, 150 records for said phonograph, a six tube radio, a suitcase and some old clothes. Frank Macy was ordered by Elko County to sell the personal belongings for \$40. Frank Macy received \$5 for his services and Elko County applied the balance to cover a portion of the funeral costs. Louis Reymond is buried in the Midas Cemetery. Some of the information recorded on his death certificate was provided by Victor Reymond of France. QUALITY TREES IN MIDAS


