NEW OLD BUILDINGS AND SIGNS In the last three years, three structures have been erected to serve as storage and display. The early 1900s era sign on the front of the blacksmith shop and the sign on the fuel & supplies store were painted by Andy Richards. Wendy Richards and Lynn Isaeff painted a sign which now is on the front of Skip & Dorry Powell's house which reads: Commissary - Gold & Silver Mines Co. This was the location for a large building which originally warehoused supplies for the Elko Prince Mining Co., and later served as a commissary and supply house for Getchell's Gold & Silver Mining Company. Jack Dempsey, a former heavyweight champion stayed there in 1931 as a guest of Getchell. A boxing ring was erected in front where Dempsey demonstrated his pugilistic skills. Rick Isaeff installed these signs as well as the sign on the fuel & supplies store. The fuel store has many kerosene items including a very old "Perfection" kerosene heater donated by Jim & Pat Swisher. Gene & Barb Casci donated some old Nevada license plates which are now displayed on the front of this store. Ken Altenreuther brought some old oil pumps and an oil dispenser. Dan & Joan Bennett donated old gas and oil containers.....as did Jody and Cathy Squires. (The Squires installed the tin roof and built the front porch.) Mark & Sheri Barlow donated old (and unopened) quart oil containers and Jerry & Garla Singleton came through with an early automobile axel. Directly north is a structure which will house items commonly found in an assay office. The front door is courtesy of Pam Mortara. Carl White donated a bunch of chemistry glass. Wes Walker furnished some new crucibles and Mark & Sheri Barlow donated some old crucibles and annealing cups. Dan & Joan Bennett donated a counter ore crusher and Carol Jackson donated a dry shaker. This building is covered with rusty tin on the sides and roof and lap board, milled specifically for this project, covers the front. For these and future projects, Powells donated an iron door, 2 vintage fire extinguishers and a compressor, Cascis: a picture of early day Midas, Richard & Mary Pincolini: wrench and impact tools, Rob & Rochelle Mazzone: two old picks, shovel and trunk, Ken & Bert Klamm: 3-30' lengths of pipe for bridge in park, Delco light plant, Paul Shelley: books and Barlows: a license plate and hames hardware. A leather repair shop is being planned. Do you have any old leather working tools, leather shoes, boots, saddles or harness, circa 1920 to 1940, we can use?

CEMETERY The cemetery received a much needed facelift this last summer. Thanks to a generous donation from Bobbi Geney in memory of her mother and father, Audrey and John Fitzgerald, the front one-half of the cemetery received a new paint job. Gus, Lori, Kalli & Eric Wegren, and Dan & Joan Bennett ganged up on the cemetery with paint brushes, mowers and weed eaters. Kalli and Eric will take care of the maintenance in the foreseeable future.

QUALITY TREES IN MIDAS

The Midas Volunteer Fire Dept., Midas Bighorn Sheep, Western Nevada Supply, Elko County, Friends of Midas and a few individual donors put together working funds to plant about 90 quality trees in the canyon. Fourteen of these trees (all spruce) bit the dust and were replaced with Austrian Pine. Individual property owners purchased about 30% of the trees. Hopefully, all of the remaining trees have survived the very heavy freeze this winter. Thanks to the many who helped transport and plant the trees. Thanks to Bernice for babysitting the trees.




